

# Your Toller's First 30 Days

Chapters Seven through Nine are the full curriculum. This appendix is the flight plan — the same material compressed into a day-by-day sequence you can actually follow while sleep-deprived, with a land shark auditing your shoelaces. Check things off. Nothing here requires more than minutes at a time, and the order matters more than the pace: if a week runs long, let it. The dog isn't reading the schedule.

One rule governs all thirty days: **everything is a paid, pleasant game**. If a step turns into a struggle, stop, shrink it, pay more. You're not behind; you're building a toller.

## Before day one: the setup

## Day 1 — arrival

- Carrier belted in the car; calm co-pilot beside it; stops planned. Protest crying is answered with presence, not freedom.
- First stop at home is the **potty spot** — cue word ready, quiet party when it works.
- One room, not a house tour. Water down, meal on the breeder's schedule, sniffing allowed, visitors not.
- Resident dog? First meeting on neutral ground before you cross the threshold (Chapter Seven has the choreography).
- Crate or pen **near your bed** tonight. Late potty run planned. Expect noise; answer need, outlast protest.
- Take one photo. You'll want Day One later, and today will otherwise be a blur.

## Days 2–3 — boring is beautiful

- Rhythm installed: out at waking, after meals, after play, before bed — cue word as it happens, payday after.
- Meals in the crate, door open. The crate only ever produces good news.
- Handling begins, seconds at a time, always paid: touch paws, ears, mouth. This is Chapter Ten's cooperative care at age nine weeks.
- Name game begins: say the name once, pay the look. The name means *good things incoming* — forever.
- No visitors yet. The world can wait three days; the settling can't.

## Days 4–7 — week one

## Days 8–14 — week two

- **Socialization is this month's real job** (the window is open NOW — Chapter Seven): carried outings, new surfaces, sounds, kinds of people — each at a distance the puppy can succeed at, each paid. Loose and curious means proceed; tucked means add distance.
- Puppy class booked (vaccine-checked, positive-methods — audit it first if you can).
- Hand-first cues begin: **sit** (point down) and the **come party** (both hands to chest, backing up, huge payday). Signal first, word later, per Chapter Nine.
- Tooth brushing proper begins: a few seconds, daily, minty and paid. In this house it's still a scheduled treat delivery six years on.
- First grooming ritual: three brush strokes, paid, done. The kit means good news.

## Days 15–21 — week three

- **Threshold protocol v1** (Chapter Nine): human first through doors, release on calm + eye contact. Every door, every time, boring as arithmetic — this is the habit that holds at gates for life.
- Cues grow: **down** joins sit and come; name response proofed in every room.
- Car practice: harness on, engine on, go nowhere, pay, done. Then a five-minute trip that ends somewhere fun.
- Alone-time stretches to real minutes; departures and returns stay ceremony-free.
- Socialization continues daily — variety beats volume; one calm new thing a day is plenty.

## Days 22–30 — week four

## The 30-day checkpoint

Score honestly — "mostly" counts as yes at this age:

- | ☐ | The puppy potties on cue at the spot, most of the time |
- | ☐ | The crate is a good place: meals eaten in it, naps taken in it, door closed without drama |
- | ☐ | The name earns an instant head-turn in the kitchen |
- | ☐ | Sit on a hand signal; come, at least indoors, like it's a party |
- | ☐ | Paws, ears, and mouth can be handled; the toothbrush is familiar |
- | ☐ | TRADE works on low-value contraband |
- | ☐ | The puppy has calmly met a dozen kinds of people, surfaces, and sounds |
- | ☐ | Everyone in the house uses the same words and signals |

Six or more: you're ahead of most dog owners on earth — keep going into Chapters Eight and Nine. Fewer: reread the relevant chapter, shrink the steps, pay more, and give it another week. Nothing on this list is a deadline; every one of them is a foundation.

## **What NOT to worry about yet**

Leash manners on real walks (the world is still too exciting). Adolescence (it's coming; Chapter Nine is ready). The scream or its absence (either is normal — Chapter Four). Off-leash anything (that's the long line's job for months yet). Whether you got "the smart one" (you did; it's a toller; that's the whole problem and the whole point).

Thirty days from now you won't have a trained dog. You'll have something better: a puppy who believes people are fair, games pay, the crate is safe, hands are good news, and its name is the best word in the language. Everything else in this book builds on exactly that.

## The new-owner shopping list

**Transport & safety:** crate/carrier (belted), car harness with seatbelt threading, dog stairs or ramp for the vehicle, long line (30 ft+), flat collar + ID, leash ×2.

**Home:** baby gates, mats inside AND outside each door, towel supply (be generous), furniture covers, orthopedic-grade bed, chew toys, frozen-chew supplies (rubber rings; blueberries and ice cubes are free).

**Feeding:** raised feeding station, slow-feeder bowls, stainless-steel water bowls, treat pouch, food per Chapter Eleven.

**Grooming:** slicker or pin brush, undercoat rake, metal comb, nail clippers or grinder, dog toothbrush + dog toothpaste (daily — yes, daily), ear wipes.

**Play & training:** Chuck It-style launcher and balls, frisbee, floating bumpers, puzzle feeders, one rubber duck destined for fame, whistle (optional but ages well).
